# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

## Statement of intent

*The Featherstone Academy is committed to investing funding from the Pupil Premium and The Recovery Premium Grant to provide opportunities for all students to achieve their full potential.*

The **Pupil Premium** is spent in an integrated and targeted way, to ensure that students receive the opportunity for additional support and access to learning opportunities. We have chosen a classroom approach and intervention strategies which research has shown works. The progress of students in receipt of this funding is monitored throughout the year at each assessment point, and the strategies are monitored and reviewed for their effectiveness.

Parents will know the progress that their child is making through regular reports and Parents' Evenings. The needs analysis for the Pupil Premium is an ongoing process throughout a student's education at The Featherstone Academy, which includes:

- Transition into the school
- Following the publication of school report data
- During Pastoral Education Plan meetings for 'Children Looked After'
- As part of a review of any other plan or provision.
- Results analysis
- Analysis of attendance and behaviour.

Furthermore, circumstances for individual students may change, meaning that a needs analysis results in some students becoming eligible for additional support.

## What We Believe In

At The Featherstone Academy, we believe in narrowing the educational attainment gap.

We believe that it is a priority to unlock the potential of those students entitled to the Pupil Premium and Free School Meals and so narrow any gap between those entitled to this support, and their peers.

**Quality First Teaching** We understand the importance of ensuring that all teaching meets the needs of each learner, rather than relying on interventions to compensate. Therefore, we develop teacher talent by investing in our Excellence Framework and coaching. We focus on ensuring that all lessons are well planned in line with our expectations. All teaching staff have a dedicated coach to ensure development. During lessons, students are expected to remain focussed at all times and ensure that they engage in the appropriate learning modes.

### **Reducing Barriers to Achievement**

We have analysed the barriers that our students specifically have and implement strategies to reduce or remove impediments to achievement. We identified a growing need to specialist literacy intervention around phonics, fluency and comprehension,

and furthermore identified gaps in core maths foundational learning on entry. In response we have employed a primary trained colleague We have employed a primary trained colleague to analyse need and put in place intervention to rapidly close the gaps and prepare students for the secondary curriculum.

Furthermore, we prioritise oracy in order to increase confidence in communication in learning and in the wider world, this is embedded in all areas of the curriculum in order to promote confidence in articulating learning and raising aspirations.

Additionally, we employ staff to provide well-targeted support to improve attendance, behaviour, social and emotional wellbeing, or links with families where these are barriers to a student's learning. We also employ trained ELSA practitioners in order to address students' emotional literacy.

There is a free breakfast provided every day for all students so that food poverty is not a barrier to attendance

### **Raising aspirations**

We endeavour to raise aspirations, resilience and to broaden students' experiences through our use of the Resilience Curriculum which is built into our KS3. Students have the opportunity to experience enrichment activities; both linked to the curriculum and after school. Students who require support to do so are identified and ensure that they get equity of opportunity. We have increased support around next steps post-16 in our endeavour to eliminate NEET students as far as possible

**At The Featherstone Academy**, we have implemented a range of strategies which support the students who qualify for pupil premium. No single intervention provides a complete solution to the complex educational needs of any school, and therefore our strategies are as individual as our students are. Our overarching aim is to close the gap in achievement between those students who are eligible for FSM, LAC and Services Children and those who are not.

The following examples outline just some of these ways we have committed our pupil premium to try and achieve our goals:

- Provision of daily contact with form tutors who build relationships with members of their form.
- A specialist SEND department who provides support for students with particular educational needs with a full-time staffed area for identified students to access support
- A dedicated member of the pastoral team who supports and nurtures, including vulnerable students.
- A pastoral member of staff dedicated to LAC.
- A Pastoral Manager who supports our most challenging students.
- 1:1 support and intervention for students who require it.
- Small group intervention and support for all students who require it, including a comprehensive intervention strategy during holidays and after school for examination groups with particular focus on small groups for Pupil Premium students.
- A curriculum under constant review which is designed to offer maximum flexibility to meet the needs of individuals.
- A broad and varied enrichment programme that offers outside of the classroom opportunities, and opportunities through Applied Resilience
- Constant staff development and training to ensure that all staff in school are able to provide for each student.

- Providing revision materials to KS4 students.
- Dedicated Primary School Teacher to address literacy and numeracy where there are significant gaps on entry to the academy
- Trips
- Leadership from a designated member of the senior team.
- ELSA trained staff leading interventions
- Free breakfast every day
- Use of ImpactEd to explore attendance of PP students and increase sense belonging as a result of findings through rewards, events and targeted intervention.
- Uniform provided where a need is identified
- Voice 21 oracy in all areas of the curriculum

## Challenges

## Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

### Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2023 to 2024 academic year.

*PP gained 58.1 % 4+ Eng/Ma ( 14.6% above national PP figures E/M 4+) and PP students gained 25.8% 5+Eng/Ma (0.2% above PP students nationally).*

*In English PP students gained 58.1% 4+ ( 2.2% higher than PP students nationally) and 48.4% of PP students gained a 5+ in English ( 7.2% highr than PP students nationally)*

*In Maths 61.3% of PP students gained Maths 4+ (11.8% higher than PP students nationally. 32.3% of PP students gained a 5+ ( 1.6% higher than PP students nationally)*

*The attendance for PP students is close to national average for PP students and has demonstrated a relative improvement. Furthermore there is demonstrated impact over time when compared to national figures for PP students. In year 11 PP students at Featherstone attended 1.4% higher than PP pupils nationally.*
